Seeing As A Painter – Topic of May Print Night

Our final Print Group meeting for the year brings us a presentation by Albany photographer David Brickman. David's stark and realistic cityscapes of the Arbor Hill neighborhood in which he lives will be familiar to recent attendees of the Capital District Photo Regional as well the exhibits he has had at Martinez Gallery in Troy, Firlefanz Gallery in Albany, the North Pointe Cultural Arts Center in Kinderhook and at Siena College.

David originally began his career as a painter, earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in Studio Art from Brown University in 1979. While he initially showed promise as a painter he found that he preferred the directness and the immediacy of photography, having learned black and white photography and darkroom technique from his older sister as a teenager. "It feeds my impatience," he says. "You see an image and if you are skilled enough and inspired enough, you capture it." He worked

for many years in black and white because his background had taught him that fine art photography was done in black and white. But then he realized that "Art, in photography, also happens in color." His training as a painter served him well in this realization and he found that when he showed his work to galleries the curators seemed to notice the color work more. While the black and white work was very good, it was the color in which David had found his own distinctive style.

Throughout this time David also taught photography at the Community Darkroom, The Junior College of Albany and The College of Saint Rose. He has also been Artist in Residence at Clayton-Bouton Junior-Senior High School in Voorheesville and The Schenectady High School of the Fine Arts.

His talents are not limited to visual art how

Kim Koza to present the 3 P's of Children and Family Portraiture

Please join us for Wednesday May 12^{th's} Slide Group Meeting. We will be welcoming SPS member Kim M. Koza to the club as a speaker.

She will be presenting her program on Children & Family Portraiture after formally declining 14 times to speak on it in the past. Kim has been an SPS member for about 10 years, and for the last 9 has been shooting as a professional, photographing weddings, bar/bat mitzvahs, and studio portraiture. It is exclusively the studio work that she does now, and that is what she will be sharing in her presentation. She will discuss three primary elements that she deals with in her children's photography everyday, what she calls the "Three P's". 'If you can handle the Three P's, you can succeed in this business!'.

There are many facets to Kim's work. She not only enjoys well earned recognition as a

ever. He has worked for many years as a writer and editor for the *Times Union, The Daily Gazette* and *Metroland* newspapers and also as a Teamster stevedore unloading banana boats at the Port of Albany. He has traveled extensively throughout the United States and Europe, living for a two year period in Florence, Italy.

Regarding his subject "Seeing as a Painter", David has this to say: "When I say 'Seeing as a Painter' I don't mean that aspect of photography where the artist starts with a photographic image and manipulates it to look painterly, that is not my approach. That's not to say that the people who do that are doing something wrong, they are not at all, it's just not where I'm coming from. I'm strictly into straight photography." David applies his training as a painter to recognize naturally occurring scenes of beauty and capture them on film. Scenes that photographers who are more action oriented might pass by.

Having published a book of his Arbor Hill work entitled *Neighborhood* and another book called *Flora*, David now finds himself working on a *Fauna* project. "I found that I had several good landscapes that included animals, which turned out to be

a natural progression from *Flora*, an impressive collection of landscapes featuring flowers."

David's talk on Wednesday, May 5, prom-

ises to be enlightening, informative and entertaining. I hope you will join us for a presentation by this talented photographer and the 1970 Regional Spelling Bee Champion, David Brickman.



* Dave took this beautiful picture one morning at Collins Park in Scotia with a Canon 10D on a tripod and a Canon 28-135 S lens. He used Photoshop for color, contrast and brightness adjustment.

- **Jack wrote: The photo was taken a number of years ago with a Nikon FE and a 28mm Nikkor using Tri-X film at 400 ASA, no filter and developed in D-76. I scanned the negative into my computer software, Picture Wndow, using a Minolta Dimage Scan Speed. I played with contrast and brightness then printed on Epson premium glossy paper using my Epson 2200 printer with black only ink setting. This was taken during the morning workouts at Saratoga.
- ***Camera- Sony Digital Cybershot F717 with fixed Carl Zeiss Vario Sonnar lens. Selective coloring in Photoshop 7.

 Taken at the Forever Young Photography studio with daughter Dayana as the model. I stopped off at Stewarts for some ice cream first and by the time we got into the studio the ice cream had nearly melted off the cone! Great shoot....wonderful memories!

- *Amy created this slide by sandwiching two images together. The first image was of a fisherman in a stream near Lake Placid. The seond image was made by using Freeman Patterson's technique of layering multiple exposures on one frame. Without advancing the film, Amy took many exposures of a forsythia shrub in full bloom. She rotated the camera and zoomed in a little bit for each exposure. The overlapping exposures added together to create a yellow swirling spiral. Amy placed the yellow spiral image behind the fisherman image and sandwiched them both into a reusable slide mount.
- ** Luba took this winner with a Nikon camera, a Tamron lens and Fuji film. It was taken after the Women's Retreat; she stopped at the Chuang Yen Monastery on Rt 301 Kent/Carmel, NY just 2-3 miles off the Taconic Parkway. This is the largest Buddhist Monastery in the eastern US and is home to the largest indoor statue of Buddha in Europe and the Americas. It's a very peaceful, pretty place...despite the snakes and turtles that kept plopping into the lake. The Praying flags were hung near the Seven Jewel Lake, blowing in the breeze.

continued from page 1 children's photographer, but creates "finer art" hand colored infrared prints,



emulsion lifts, transfers, slides, monochromatic, and digital work. Kim also communicates emotional aspects of her life in her shadowbox art. She makes shadowboxes by combining elements of design and composition with things that speak to her, like her grandfather's letters to her grandmother, articles of clothing, meaningful family photographs, keys and jewelry, into a collective, three dimensional representation, a "shadowbox". She exhibited her

shadowbox collection at Congregation Gates of Heaven In May of 2003 and continues to create new pieces for her collection.

> Kim's eve for photography reveals itself her studio portraiture, separating her work from the everyday look of many studios. She has an uncanny ability to get kids to "be themselves", forgetting the camera and allowing images that captures the subjects as they really are. She has excellent regional recognition as "that wonderful photographer on Pine Street in Scotia", and has customers, literally, everywhere she goes in the area. Her work has been described as gentle, magical, and is consistently excellent. It's in her blood, and the proof is in her daughter Jessica's well recognized artistic abilities, and she graciously encourages those around her to create as well.

Kim M. Koza won the Daily Gazette KINSA competitions, sponsored by Kodak, garnering 1st place for the Black & White category in 1994, and both the Black & White and Color categories in 1995. She won the 1995 New England Camera Club's Peoples Choice Award, the 1995 Altamont State Fair Merit Award, the 1997 New England Camera Club's Willem Pannebaker award for Best Still Life, and numerous Peoples Choice and Honor awards ever since. Since becoming a

member of the Schenectady Photographic Society, she earned the 1994/95 Monochrome Print of the Year award, won Color Print of the year in 1995/96, placed 2nd in all three print categories in 1996/97, won Assigned Topic Printmaker of the Year in 1997/1998. Kim was 1st place General Topic Printmaker of the Year in 1998/99, 1999/2000, and 2001/02, won Print of the Year in 2000/01, and General Topic Slidemaker of the Year in 2002/03. Her(100+) images represented by the Stock Photography company Corbis(Corbis.com) are regularly picked up for calendars, cards, and other publications.


Jeff Perkins has been accepted into the Mary Ellen Mark workshop at the Woodstock Center for Photography this summer.
