Harry Wirtz is a photographer and graphic production artist who makes his home in rural Edinburg, NY, in the southern Adirondack Park.

His photography, spanning thirty years, encompasses educational slide shows, products, musicians, landscapes, and still lifes. Recent exhibits in the region in 2005 include group shows at Albany Center Galleries, Mohawk-Hudson Regional Artist Exhibition, and the Perrella Gallery. Working with both large format film and digital equipment, he does hand-made

limited edition books of photographs and close-up nature panoramas. His graphic arts services extend from retail advertising through book layouts, with web design a new experience over the past year.

His presentation on Wednesday, January 4 for the Schenectady Photographic Society will be about his photography, in the form of a projected presentation with actual prints. He will share his thinking about photography and issues related to achieving high-resolution images and prints from both film originals and digital files.

Photographic Society of America has had print and slide salon information available to members for many years. The most recent are the digital salons. These exhibitions give competitors the opportunity to show their creativity to international photography groups and have them judged. Winners get acceptances, points and possible medals. The accepted images are burned to a CD and all participants receive a copy. On slide night I will show several of these salons, as well as a publication of images

that compete in one of the world's largest, the Austrian Super Circuit. The submissions; prints, slides and digital images are submitted by the administrators to 4 European Salons, in over 13 different topics for prizes ranging from complete Hasselblad outfits to several digital cameras. These images are the best in the world and competition is open to amateurs and professionals alike.

Digital Does Vegas

What a great town! As a photographer, Las Vegas has so much to offer. You incredible have architecture, fascinating landscapes, beautiful mountain ranges with sunsets galore, beautiful and not so beautiful people. Las Vegas is a very affordable vacation destination from Albany, particularly if you look for airline and hotel specials and stay only Monday through Thursday evening. We had a great room at the Luxor Hotel for only \$89 a night, including a bunch of free meals and other freebies!

Besides all the stuff to photograph in town, especially at night with incredible colored lights, there is beautiful Red Rock Canyon to tour and capture beautiful images only 20 minutes west of Las Vegas . I chose my Konica-Minolta Maxxum 7D camera with the kit 24-100 8mm digital lens and a 16 mm 2.8 Minolta lens. I brought three 1 GB CompactFlash cards and a 40 GB PD 70 X digital wallet for plenty of backup storage. The only filter I brought for daytime use was a circular polarizer.


One of the advantages of this camera is built-in Anti-

shake technology. This gives you three usable stops so that one can handhold the camera where as with non-Antishake/image stabilization, a tripod would be required. None

> of my shots required a tripod. Even the night shots of the beautiful half size Eiffel Tower and the Statue of Liberty replica, were comfortably captured with ISO 800, handheld. I took a beautiful photograph of a Sammy Davis Jr. impersonator doing his famous song "Mr. Bo Jangles", handheld at ISO 1600. This is one of the main advantages of professional digital SLR cameras, the ability to change ISO on-the-fly and get high quality, low noise images even as high as 1600 and in some cases 3200. 


Photo Essay meeting to be held January 25th.

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Recover lost digital photos

from the Kim Kommando show Nov 30, 2005

Q. Somehow I managed to lose my family vacation pictures from the digital camera. All I wanted to do was edit them. They must still be on the memory card. But how do I retrieve them, or who can do that kind of work? My wife's 43rd birthday and my daughter's 8th birthday are on this card. Both are ready to kill me. Your urgent reply would be considered life-saving.

A. A memory card mishap can range from nuisance to devastation. And some photos are worth more than any camera. That's especially true of photos of our kids, who don't stay little for long.

Given the importance of these pictures, I'd look first at recovery services. There are a number of firms that do recovery work. FlashFixers offers such a service. Others include Media Recover and eProvided. Prices for these services vary with each request.

Don't forget about local shops. Check your phone directory for photography stores or data recovery. Call around. Ask how much experience these people have, and whether they do the work themselves. They may farm it out.

If you prefer to do this yourself, there is plenty of software around. Some good examples include PhotoRescue (\$29), ImageRecall (\$40), Search and Recover (\$40), and ZAR32 (\$99).

Each offers a free trial version that allows you to determine if your photos are recoverable.

Lexar, a maker of memory cards, also offers recovery software. Its Image Rescue 2.0 is \$30. It does not show a trial version.

Notes from two of our members:

Nick Argyros: I recently bought a 512 LEXAR CF and on the chip was a copy of Image Rescue. Look at the fine print on the package to see if it is included at no extra cost.

SanDisk offers to sell their recovery software for \$30.

Len Meiselman: I found myself in the same situation recently and found freeware at www.convar.com. The program is Image Inspector and works fine. Recovered every picture ever written to this 1gig card which apparently had not been overwritten.

Monitor Calibration

I get questons all the time regarding color management. The most common question-"I want the image on my monitor to look my prints, where do I start?"

Calibrate your monitor. It's quick and easy to do and Adobe has even provided the tools necessary to do it.

PC users will find the utility **Adobe Gamma** in the Control Panels.

Mac OSX users will find the utility **Calibrate** in the System Preferences.

Choose **System Prefs > Display** and click on the Color tab. Both utilities provide step by step instructions for calibrating the first piece of hardware in the digital workflow, the monitor.

Successful Critique Night

The Print Group meeting last month centered around the annual Critique Night. Forty-five prints were entered for consideration, there was no assigned topic, and a member could submit a maximum of two prints. Each print received detailed criticism from the judges, and occasionally from the audience. Judges were Gary Hollinger, a local professional photographer who has judged at SPS many times; Stephanie White, a former president of SPS who has judged our print competitions previously; and Tom Knight, also a former president of the Society who was passing through the area and was invited to participate.

Of particular interest and occasionally to the amusement of the audience was the not infrequent conflict between judges. This just highlighted yet once again the subjective nature of judging fine art photography. At times, it seemed as the audience was judging the judges, whether they realized it or not!

Some lessons were learned in this second iteration of Critique Night: Having three judges' comment on a print is probably too much—two judges are adequate, and two prints per person may be excessive. Winners Notes:

* Taken with a Nikon F100 on a tripod, a Nikon 300 mm f4 lens and Velvia 100 film. It was in the morning at the Crossings Park in Colonie. The two leaves were in a small frozen ditch making rhythmic patterns in the ice.

** Camera: Nikon F3, Film: Fuji Provia 100. Lens: 135mm Novoflex short mount - adapted for Bellows. Also, 2 extension tubes, a 2x tele-extender and full bellows extension yielded about a 6x total magnification on film.

Entire unit was mounted on a rigid copy stand - and a focussed microscope illuminator was used as a light source. Since the light source was about 2800 degrees Kelvin, I chose not to filter it, as it accentuated the brass of the watch face with very "yellow" light.

The tick was - at one time - live, and as the judge said - many times - totally unnecessary for the photo - but very necessary because of the title of the image. Key factor with this set up - lots of bracketing for the right exposure - use mirror-lock-up and a remote release so as not to introduce any vibration to the rig.

Bill DeLaney had photo published


