Exploration of Night Photography Presented by Michael Noonan by leff Plant

The Projected Images Group is pleased to kick off the 2008-09 year by presenting Michael Noonan, a professional photographer based in Ballston Spa. Mr. Noonan has been a professional photographer for more than 35 years.

Several years ago Mr. Noonan showed his images of comet Hale-Bopp to SPS. He will, on October 8, talk on "night photography", as well as other aspects of his work. He has photographed many aspects of the night sky, including eclipses and aurora, and in addition, is a master of painting with light.

Mr. Noonan also photographs a number of subjects for clients, including Revolutionary and French & Indian War reenactments, the Saratoga Race Track, and portraits.

He is co-author of books on the history of Saratoga Springs and Ballston Spa, for which he printed images from historic negative.

Mr. Noonan is still a strong advocate for, and practitioner of, traditional darkroom arts and black & white photography, while much of his night photography is done in color.

Mr. Noonan is an advocate of deeply involving himself in the sounds and total atmosphere of the subjects he is photographing, such as the cadences of the mason's hammers on a stone bridge-building project he documented.

Night photography opens a fascinating parallel world of photographic subjects, and I am sure that Mr Noonan's explication of night photography techniques will be of great interest to SPS members.



October Print Group presents: Bromoil Printing Processing by Jill Skupin by Robert Near

We are pleased to announce that Jill Skupin Burkholder will be the October print group guest presenter. Jill actively practices the fine art of bromoil printing and will be doing a presentation of her images along with actually demonstrating bromoil by producing a bromoil print that night.

The Bromoil Process was an early photographic process first discovered in 1907 which quickly became a great favorite of the photographers of the Pictorialist Movement, led by Alfred Stieglitz and the Photo-Sessionist Group. The soft, paint-like qualities of the prints are very typical for this genre, and have recently led to some art photographers using the process again. Because the print is hand crafted, it is unique; no two images will be the same.

The Bromoil process was based on the oil print, whose origins go back to the mid-nineteenth century. A drawback of oil prints was that the gelatin used was too slow to permit an enlarger to be used, so that negatives had to be the same dimensions as the positives. After G.E.H. Rawlins published a 1904 article on the oil print process, E.J. Wall in 1907 described theoretically how it should be possible to use a smaller negative in an enlarger to produce a silver bromide positive, which should then be bleached and hardened, to be inked afterwards as in the oil process. C Welborne Piper then executed this theory in practice, and so the Bromoil process was born.

Please join us for what should be a wonderful presentation as we kick off the year with the first print group meeting on October 1st 2008.

For almost 20 years, Rick has written the weekly photography column, Camera Angles, for the Associated Press. He also writes travel features for AP and has taught for Popular Photography and Imaging, the Maine Photographic Workshop and eDigitalPhoto. He has won the Ben Franklin Award for Best Children's book "Hide and Seek Under the Sea", Golden Light Award for Best Nature book ("Flying Flowers"), Diver of the Year ("Beneath the Sea"), and the NOGI Award (the Underwater Oscar). Despite the accolades, he remains down-to-earth, approachable and, above all, interested in the world and its people. A quick review of his website (www.ricksammon.com) allows this to be evident in his photographs.

Be sure to bring a friend, neighbor, interested photo-student or potential SPS member with you. This will be an excellent opportunity to



get the photo-juices moving and will certainly be a highlight of our Fall programming.

Schenectady Photographic Society Print Competition Rules, 2008-2009

The purpose of the competition is to provide a venue for showing prints. The competitive element exists to add interest, and these rules are intended to provide order in the competition and simplify the process of handling prints. Judging is inherently subjective and does not yield a definite evaluation of the merits of individual images.

1. Monthly Competitions **October-April**

*Only dues-paid members may enter.

*Three Categories:

Monochrome—Images consisting of one color. Uniformly toned images are acceptable in this category.

Color—including partially toned and handcolored images.

Assigned Topic—images/negatives must have been made after May 1, 2008.

Each maker may enter three prints each month. However, one of the three must be entered in the monochrome category. And no more than two prints may be entered in any one category.

Presentation:

*Prints must be 5x7 or larger. An exception will be made where the process is not conducive to enlargement (eg. Polaroid, contact print, etc.).

*Overmats are optional.

*Mounts must be 8x10 or larger, but may not exceed 16x20.

*Colored mounts or mats and multiple overmats are not allowed. Mounts/mats must be white or black.

*Prints in frames are not allowed.

*Prints requiring special handling are not allowed. The print chair may disqualify prints that, in his/her sole judgment, may present risk of physical harm to other prints.

*Signed prints are not allowed.

*Prints must be submitted to the registrars, between 7-7:30 p.m. on the night of competition. Prints must have a 3x5 card (available on the night of competition) with required information filled in and placed on upper left corner of the mount.

Printing and mounting may be done commercially.

*Prints that "place" may not be re-entered in entered more than two times.

2. Judging and Scoring

*An impartial judge will evaluate each print for etc., until a clear winner emerges. composition, technical execution and impact,

presentation. The judging of the assigned topic category will include the additional factor of how well the image responds to the assignment.

*Prints will be displayed on racks under normal room lighting for judging. The arrangement of prints on the display racks will be at the discretion of the print stewards. The judge will not be given titles at the time of judging.

*Judges will be asked to comment on prints that "place", and if time allows, on other prints that deserve discussion. This discussion is intended to help members and visitors discern the strengths and weaknesses that the judges see in the prints.

*For the purpose of the Printmaker of the Year awards, prints that place in competition will be awarded points as follows:

1st place	7 points
2nd place	5 points
3rd place	4 points
4th place	3 points
5th place	2 points
Honorable Mention	1 point

If the number of entries is limited, the Print Chair may, at his/her sole discretion, eliminate one or more of the "places" for that month.

3. Year End Competitions

Print of the Year

*Separate Monochrome and Color Print competitions will be held at the May meeting.

*Only prints that have been entered into a monthly competition during the 08-09 season of SPS may be entered into the Print of the Year competition(s).

*Entries must bear the original entry card on the back of the mount.

*Presentation and entry rules are the same as for the monthly competitions.

*Each maker may submit up to two entries in each of the Print of the Year categories.

Printmaker of the Year

*Recognition for Printmaker of the Year, and 2nd Place & 3rd Place Printmaker of the Year will be awarded *The original image must be the work of the maker. in 3 categories of Monochrome, Color and Assigned Topic.

*Award selection will be based on total points accumulated during the Oct-Ap. monthly competitions of subsequent monthly competition. Prints may not be the respective categories. In case of a tie, the person with the most 1st place scores will be judged the winner. If 1st place scores are tied, then 2nd place scores will be used,

SPS Print Night Competition Panoramic submission

During the 08– 09 SPS year we are going to allow panoramic images to be submitted into print night competition. To do justice to panoramic images we are adjusting the maximum mount size; see additional Print Competition rules below for panoramic images. Schenectady Photographic Society Print Competition Rules apply to panoramic images except for these additions.

• Mounts may not exceed 10"x 26"

• Members will be allowed to enter only **one** panoramic image per monthly competition.

• Panoramic images do not have their own group therefore they must be entered into Monochrome, Color, or Assigned topic.

<u>A Balancing Act</u>

In order to balance the number of competitions in the Projected Images Group between traditional slides and digital images, the April, 2009 meeting will have competitions in <u>both</u> the slide and digital categories. The already announced assigned topic, "Patterns" will be used for <u>both</u> the slide and digital competitions that night. It will be interesting to compare the same topic done in both mediums.

As an experiment (and departure from past practice) the judges for Projected Image nights will be given only the titles of the works submitted.

We encourage all SPS members to compete in the Projected Images competitions, as projection with light offers a different and very powerful method of displaying images. Let's show the print people how good projected images can be!
