



Deep Trance Art


camera. I'm constantly shooting snapshots that I can later use in my triptychs. I am particularly drawn to shooting objects in such a way that they are abstracted. Their true identity is less important than what the viewer self-creates upon viewing the whole piece. In fact this is all a metaphor for the hypnosis process which begins by trying to figure 'it' out and only becomes successful when the participant simply accepts what is presented as a whole unto itself. Each whole can then be accepted as a symbol that can be used to attach an emotion that serves the viewer as they remember the experience on a deeper level.



I've been an artist all my life but it took 50 years to come to discover what it is that I needed to create. The format of my work is based on a model of the mind that was presented to me at a hypnosis training in 2011. The instructor divided the space into three areas representing the conscious, subconscious and unconscious portions of the mind. I immediately accepted this as the format for my artwork; the triptych.

I began using pastels, then collage, then digital collage.

I approach creating my work by first collecting images with a



The works that I will be discussing are made with photographic images manipulated in a very basic computer program commonly available to anyone. The process is far less important than the results. I am very interested in the relationship between the three sections of the triptych and most importantly the relationship between the whole triptych and the viewer.

I look forward to presenting images that cause discussion, that are curious and interesting.

Color as an Image and Graphic


Create interesting images with color and polarizing filters. My interest was piqued by Jeff Perkins article in the Jan FOCUS.

I have used polarizing filters to get interesting color images and stress patterns in plastic transparent objects such as the wrappers on cigarettes, gum, store purchases, acrylic utensils, plastic wrap on computer electronics, scotch tape and many other objects made of plastic.

camera to get maximum color effects.

I set my camera on auto and keep camera on a tripod for stability.

On rotating the on camera polarizing filter I observe the stress patterns in the plastic which gives interesting color patterns and designs. When these images are placed in Photoshop the intensity and contrasts of color can be augmented to your liking.

I have enclosed several examples of this use. Experiment and find your own.

In order to photograph these objects you need a polarizer on your lens and a sheet of polarizing material behind your subject. Sheets of polarizing material can be obtained from Edmund Scientific, ets.

As a light source I use a large lightbox on which I put my subject on the sheet of polarizing material.




