At the first meeting, members used "dots" to vote on the selections they chose. The Board spent a good deal of time analyzing the views of the members, and we discussed the results at a later meeting.

Over the summer, it was up to the Board to incorporate some of those changes into our 2017-2018 schedule...and so we did!

The message from the President will talk about some of these changes (see page 2).

One of the first changes you will notice is this newsletter. The *Focus* is now interactive. That is, it has been redesigned for the web, and will include hyper links that will allow you to jump to or access websites, etc. Check it out at the top where our website is listed: www.spsphoto.org. Click on it, and you will be directed to the website. For clarity, these hyper links will always be bold and in red.

Here are some of the other changes this season:

1. Meeting start time will be **7:00 pm**

2. Our first meeting will not be our standard "kick-off" but rather a "Meet and Greet" with refreshments to start the meeting, and a discussion of critiquing and the "12 Elements of a Merit Image."

3. Our first two regularly-scheduled "competitions" will not be competitions at all—but critiquing sessions. If you have never competed, or even if you are a regular competitor, you will be able to bring in your print (October 4) or upload your image (October 11) for constructive comments by fellow members. These photos can (if you wish) be entered in our regular competitions beginning in November. (Thus there will be one less competition in each of the print and projected categories for this season.)

4. The schedule has been reduced to three meetings per month (except in December). See schedule on page 19.

Yes, I am sure it all sounds a bit daunting, but it is our hope to attract new members (see article on the newly-formed Communications Committee on page 5), encourage more members to participate in club activities, and compete. 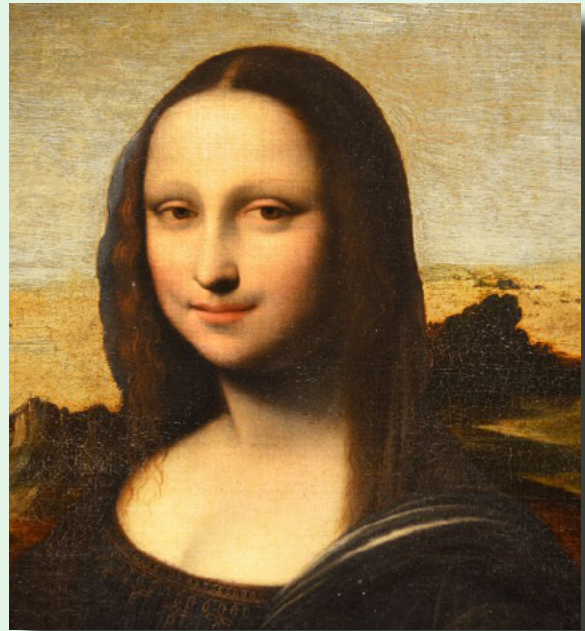

Critiquing Photographs is More Than a Technicality...

What catches your eye?,

What is the photographer/artist trying to portray?

Does the image follow any compositional rules?



Our first two “competitions” this season are not competitions at all, but rather critiquing sessions to help guide you to improve your images. Of course, judging (and critiquing) are always a bit subjective.

But perhaps some general guidelines will help steer you in the right direction, and give you the confidence to enter a competition or two this season. Our first meeting is dedicated to discussing what makes an “award-winning” image, as compiled by the Professional Photographers of America Exhibition Committee. Let’s begin with a quick example...

So we are in the Louvre and looking at the Mona Lisa. A little more formal than our meeting room and our photo judging, but it’s the same process. To provide a worthwhile critique of someone’s photos we have to have a desire to help honestly and constructively. You should avoid phrases such as “I like it” or “oh cool”, “very nice” or “yuck.” Beyond the technical...

- How does the photo make you feel or think?
- What do you see first in the photo and is it the right thing the photographer is emphasizing?
- What about the photograph do you like or dislike?
- If the photographer shares the reason for the photo, does it do what he or she intended it to do?

Then there is also the technical aspect of a critique:

- Is the photo properly exposed, under or over?
- Did the photographer follow composition techniques (like the rule of thirds or leading lines)? If not, were the rules broken successfully?
- Is selective focus or depth of field used to blur the background; if so, is it successful?
- Is color used effectively, or would the image have more impact if it were done in black and white?
- Does the background work well with the subject, and is the horizon level?
- Speaking of focus, are all the elements that need to be in focus, in focus and sharp? Is focus soft (selective) where it needs to be, such as in a close portrait?

And more... Are there elements that protrude into the frame that are distracting? What is unique about the image and why did the photographer want to capture this image? This is just a brief set of questions to get us thinking in the right direction to help each other.

“12 Elements of a Merit Image”

(Continued)

Is it a bit mysterious as to what makes an “award-winning” image? Are the judges’ comments perhaps a bit mysterious as well? Immediately following our “meet and greet,” our season opener will discuss the “12 Elements of a Merit Image” and the art of critiquing photographs.

The Photographic Exhibitions Committee of the Professional Photographers of America uses the 12 elements below as the “gold standard” to define a merit image. The use of these 12 elements connects the modern practice of photography and its photographers to the historical practice of photography begun nearly two centuries ago.

Twelve elements have been defined as necessary for the success of an art piece or image. Any image, art piece, or photograph will reveal some measure of all twelve Competition Elements, while a visually superior example will reveal obvious consideration of each one.

1.) **Impact** is the sense one gets upon viewing an image for the first time. Compelling images evoke laughter, sadness, anger, pride, wonder or another intense emotion. There can be impact in any of these twelve elements.

2.) **Technical** excellence is the print quality of the image itself as it is presented for viewing. Retouching, manipulation, sharpness, exposure, printing, mounting, and correct color are some items that speak to the qualities of the physical print.

3.) **Creativity** is the original, fresh, and external expression of the imagination of the maker by using the medium to convey an idea, message or thought.

4.) **Style** is defined in a number of ways as it applies to a creative image. It might be defined by a specific genre or simply be recognizable as the characteristics of how a specific artist applies light to a subject. It can impact an image in a positive manner when the subject matter and the style are appropriate for each other, or it can have a negative effect when they are at odds.

5.) **Composition** is important to the design of an image, bringing all of the visual elements together in concert to express the purpose of the image. Proper composition holds the viewer in the image and prompts the viewer to look where the creator intends. Effective composition can be pleasing or disturbing, depending on the intent of the image maker.

6.) **Presentation** affects an image by giving it a finished look. The mats and borders used, either physical or digital, should support and enhance the image, not distract from it.

7.) **Color Balance** supplies harmony to an image. An image in which the tones work together, effectively supporting the image, can enhance its emotional appeal. Color balance is not always harmonious and can be used to evoke diverse feelings for effect.

8.) **Center of Interest** is the point or points on the image where the maker wants the viewer to stop as they view the image. There can be primary and secondary centers of interest. Occasionally there will be no specific center of interest, when the entire scene collectively serves as the center of interest.

9.) **Lighting** — the use and control of light — refers to how dimension, shape and roundness are defined in an image. Whether the light applied to an image is man-made or natural, proper use of it should enhance an image.

10.) **Subject Matter** should always be appropriate to the story being told in an image.

11.) **Technique** is the approach used to create the image. Printing, lighting, posing, capture, presentation media, and more are part of the technique applied to an image.

12.) **Story Telling** refers to the image’s ability to evoke imagination. One beautiful thing about art is that each viewer might collect his own message or read her own story in an image.

It will be located on the website (spsphoto.org) and you will be able to pay with your debit card, credit card, or PayPal. This on-line form will also make it easy to "share" through social media.

Photo classes were offered at both beginner and advanced levels.

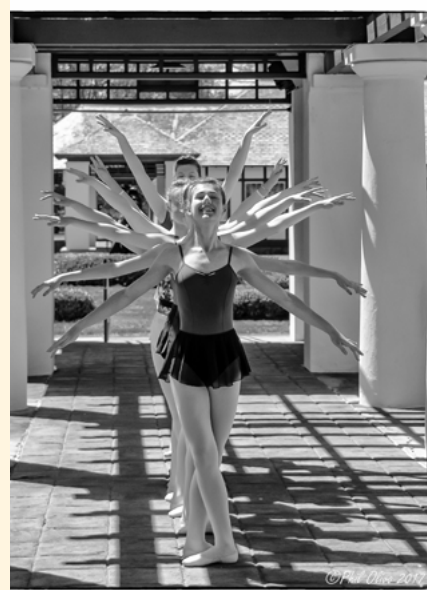
Classes met on Saturdays, April 29th, May 6th, May 20th at 9:30 am and Thursday, May 11th at 5:30 pm.

A TRIP DOWN UNDER No...Not Australia

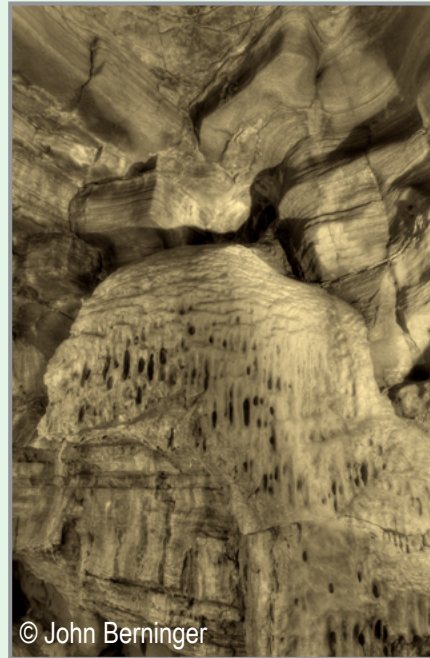

On August 16th, six adventurous souls (Ellen Christiansen, Marianne Rahn-Erickson, Jerry Boehm, John Berninger, Phil Olivo, and Brian Sherman) decided they had enough of the sunny, 87 degree weather and wanted to escape to a dark, humid world permanently at 52 degrees for the sole purpose of giving their cameras a workout. **The Howe Caverns Photo Tour** was an exceptionally enjoyable experience for the group. A perfect opportunity for the intrepid Society members to reacquaint themselves with full manual controls on their cameras, create with light and texture, and experiment with HDR post processing. And oh yeah, to capture the feeling of the underground world and flowing streams located 153 feet below the hills surrounding the Schoharie Valley.

After an abbreviated guided tour, our indomitable crew spent the next two hours roaming freely through the cavern taking photos wherever they liked. For those on a first time visit to the cavern, they also opted to take a quick boat ride.

John commented that he enjoyed taking photographs in the caverns because it was so different from anything else he has done. "The darkness, artificial light, and the unusual shapes and textures of the caverns made for a challenging and fun evening."

Jerry captured the essence of the wildly varying artificial light illuminating the pathway through the cavern. His new nickname is "the Master of White Balance".

John's toned images captured the eerie feel of the rock formations, and the clarity of the reflections of the cave surroundings in the water below is incredible.

Phil used black and white imagery and a border to play with the dark shadows and capture the unique textures of the rock formations in his otherworldly abstract that is a brilliant study in the directionality of light on a subject.

Brian merged several images using HDR to dramatically document the path through a larger section of the cavern, and while experimenting with using a 360 degree VR camera, shared with us the full panoramic of that "place" underground.



It was an exceptional opportunity for experiencing camaraderie with fellow photographers. And yes, we did remind each other, as we descended into the depths via the elevator, to turn off stabilization while shooting on a tripod!

CARLA SHAPIRO • TO CAPTURE A SHADOW

*The Center for Photography @ Woodstock
Exhibition: August 19 – October 15, 2017*

This newest body of work represents an intuitive re-imagining of moments and experiences through a subtractive and additive process. Shapiro's process includes a reworking of the original photographic image in many layers of manipulation: in camera as she photographs, through scratching the film, by printing the images in platinum palladium, by sanding down the prints themselves and, finally, by reconceptualizing the images in digital format, then carefully reprinting them on delicate Japanese bamboo papers. Each step of her process takes her further from the precision of an in-camera image and deeper into an emotional or even spiritual realm of existence. Appropriated from her own images, her digital prints represent fragmented impressions that run from raw to pensive, apprehensive or sullen to hopeful and inquisitive.

FREDRIK MARSH • THE DRESDEN PROJECT

*The Center for Photography @ Woodstock
Exhibition: August 19 – October 15, 2017*

Marsh's photographs capture a delicate time of transition in former East German cities, just before many diachronic apartments, called "Altbauwohnungen," were gutted and renovated to make room for a newer, Western lifestyle. These striking images allow for one more brief celebration of these well-worn walls that range from graceful grandeur to ingeniously personal efforts of home beautification. In their abandoned states, these once private spaces are heavy with the suggested presence of their inhabitants. A faint echo of home still rings from these walls, fragile and violated through the churning of time. Under the careful guidance of the artist, we are allowed to take one last look at the dilapidated interiors, rich with delicate wallpaper patterns and neglectful abandon.

IMAGES OF INTERNMENT: THE INCARCERATION OF JAPANESE AMERICANS DURING WORLD WAR II

*William J. vanden Heuvel Gallery at Hyde Park
Currently running through December 31, 2017*

IMAGES OF INTERNMENT begins with a small document-focused display that briefly introduces the context behind FDR's decision to issue Executive Order 9066. Visitors then enter the exhibition's main gallery where they will encounter over 200 photographs (including some reproduced in dramatically large formats) that provide a visual record of the forced removal of Japanese Americans and their lives inside the restricted world of the remote government camps operated by the War Relocation Authority (WRA). The WRA visual records include the work of Dorothea Lange, Clem Albers, Francis Stewart, and Hikaru Iwasaki. It also features photographs taken by Ansel Adams at the Manzanar camp and a selection of photos shot by George and Frank Hirahara, who were held at the Heart Mountain camp in Wyoming.

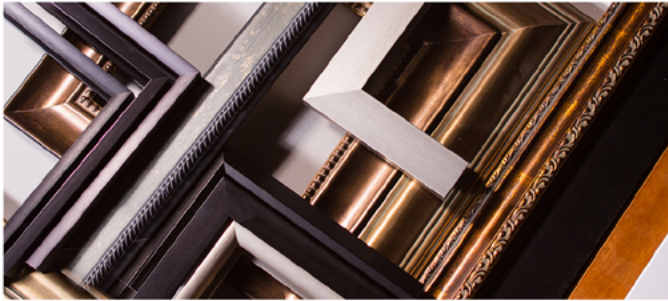
