



I recall the excitement of holding a new Nikon F in 1966. My interest was curtailed, however, when the camera was stolen from my apartment in Boston after owning it for only a couple of months-the shock of walking into a ransacked apartment is still with me. I was able to replace the camera with an identical one and did some street photography in Boston; an example of what I did with this camera is seen here titled "Friends". This is in addition to a totally different type of photography done in my laboratory at Boston University Medical School where I did research on cells and tissues using an electron microscope. This research produced thousands of B&W prints, none of which will ever be seen at an SPS meeting!

The next chapter in my life in photography occurred in Australia in 1967-1969. I was working in a government research lab and I joined the Parramatta Camera Club (Parramatta is a small city on the outskirts of Sydney). I was active in the club (which was much smaller than SPS), participated in club competitions, and had work accepted in regional and national exhibitions. An example of my work titled "Man on Bench" is seen here and was taken in a park in Sydney. During this time I was doing my own film processing using Tri-X developed with Microdol and printed on Agfa Brovira paper.

We returned to the USA in 1969 to my new job at Columbia University in New York City. At this time I entered a period of photo inactivity due to the demands of a new job and a growing family. Except for recording family events and the growth of two sons, I did little "serious" photography for 30 years.

As I approached retirement from the faculty of Albany Medical College, I wanted to become re-involved with photography. I learned that the Adirondack Mountain Club was offering a weekend photo workshop taught by Curt Miller, an experienced photographer and member of the SPS. The experience was the catalyst to get me back into photography. I asked Curt about photo clubs in the Albany area and he told me that the SPS was the only one. I followed his advice, went to a meeting, liked what I saw, and joined in 2000. I've held various offices, including president in 2008.

A couple of the images I produced for SPS competitions are shown on the following page. In addition to involvement with the SPS, I have enjoyed producing photo books, mainly through Shutterfly, and have participated in photography workshops in places like Snow Farm in the Berkshires, Ghost Ranch in New Mexico, Arizona State University, and with Carl Heilman in the Adirondacks.

An interesting, possibly unique, photographic experience I had several years ago was in the desert in Utah. I went on a high school photography field trip to an abandoned wool mill (my son is a faculty member of the school and that was my "in"). I was able to use an 11x14 view camera to photograph dirty, greasy machinery and then to compare those images with what I obtained with my Nikon N80 film camera. Expecting an obvious difference in image quality between the 11x14 contact print and the 11x14 enlargement from a 35mm frame, I was surprised to find the two prints remarkably similar.

HONOR YOUR OWN UNIQUE VISION by John Barclay

Editor's Note: Way back in 2009 I took this photo at a college basketball game in Madison Square Garden. I loved it. I knew it was risky to enter into competition with the large out of focus "blob" in lower right-hand corner. But enter it I did. Needless to say, it scored miserably. But it spoke to me and captured the moment. (A young man playing in his "garden of dreams.") When I read John Barclay's newsletter, I remembered this image. I remembered how I felt at the low score, but in my heart I loved the image (and still do).

I continue to compete because it motivates me; but I enter the images that "speak to me" and not necessarily ones that I think will "score."

I believe John's message is perfect for anyone entering images into competition or seeking "feedback" in some way.

Recently, on Facebook, I tried an experiment. I posted a picture and shared my thoughts about a particular image. I don't normally ask for feedback, but this time I queried my audience, "So much here that I normally would not include; the bush, the background, shooting vertically in the dunes..." So, in effect, I was saying to my audience, "I know this could be flawed!" I was intrigued by their responses. Some loved it, but many did not.

I'd like to make some observations in hopes that we can grow from this little experiment. As soon as I gave permission by asking, "I think it works. You?" I knew I was going to get feedback. My friend, Cole Thompson, asks in his excellent lecture, "Why would you ask other's opinions about YOUR vision?" I believe this to be a fair question. Who knows more about my vision than me? Why would I give someone else permission to tell me how I should interpret a particular scene? More importantly, what happens when I get that feedback I asked for; especially feedback that goes against my choices?

If you're a typical photographer, who has just received negative comments about your work, you may feel a little knot in your stomach. You may feel disappointment. You might even wince! My guess is, the next thing you will do is begin to question your settings, your composition, your perspective, or your next photograph! "Hum... maybe they are right? Maybe it is too centered, has too much processing, is not balanced, should be a square, etc, etc." These are the dangerous artistic waters in which we need to tread very carefully.

Again I ask, who knows more about your vision than you, the photographer? I fully understand the need for feedback as we are learning our craft, however, at some point, I believe you need to honor your own vision. Resist the need to get feedback, and, instead, learn to trust your own unique perspective.
