WELCOME TO THE 2019–2020 SOCIETY SEASON

We again will kickoff our season with a "Member's Choice" competition on Wednesday, September 25. For new members or folks who have not entered prints into competition, this is a great way to dip your toes into the water. (There actually won't be any water as we have a bunch of electrical cords crisscrossing the floor; and, while adding water could make things exciting, our insurance premiums would skyrocket).

Here's how "Member's Choice" works. You bring a matted print you haven't entered in a previous competition. The print can be color or monochrome. All prints are assigned a number, and all members can cast one vote for their favorite print (except their own). We'll critique each entry before the voting and after the vote we'll announce a winner who will be awarded a \$25 Amazon gift certificate.

And while all that is happening, we'll have disorganized milling around so you can catch up with those members you haven't seen all summer and laud them with great stories of your photographic exploits or how you resolved your Gear Acquisition Syndrome (GAS). We'll have our usual assortment of goodies (*and feel free to bring some snacks to share!*) available along with coffee, tea, and maybe even cider and soda.

Your board held six meetings (although it felt like so many more) over the summer to prepare for the new season. Primarily, we were scheduling activities and corralling speakers and judges for our print and digital competition nights as well as speakers for our event nights. We also developed a schedule of photo walks and excursions for the season. Some of these have already been announced, for example a Christman Sanctuary walk on September 28, and a trip to Bannerman Castle on October 20 (this trip is already at capacity). For our first print competition on October 2, SPS member Connie Frisbee Houde will speak on "Developing a Personal Photography Project." On November 2, Mark Sweeney will present a Luba Ricket Creativity Seminar; we're bringing back former longtime SPS member Dr. Jeff Perkins for a December 11 presentation on "Street Photography"; and jumping way ahead, we have scheduled a May 6 presentation by Matt Pollock on night photography to be followed by a June 19 Milky Way Workshop with Matt at Cherry Plains State Park.

We got quite a bit of feedback on how we handle judging when our scheduled judge does not show up. Our emergency response was to select a member to fill in. We've now developed a different judge replacement procedure that uses a rotating three-member judge team selected from board members who will use a voting process similar to those used in PSA competitions. Were we to use one of those judge teams on a night when they had competition entries, which they would then have to withdraw, we would give them equivalent additional entry(s) during a similar future competition during the current season.

We also firmed up our cancellation procedure for when we have to call off a scheduled meeting for bad weather. We'll discuss that before the snow and ice are upon us, as I don't want to participate in the Second Annual Olivo Ice Tumbling Competition.

The good news is we've got an active, participating, and raucous board. The better news is that we've developed an interesting and varied schedule. Should be a terrific time to be a member of the Schenectady Photographic Society.

MOONSTRUCK...INCLUDE IT IN YOUR IMAGES OCTOBER 16 - Jim Craner

Our fascination with the moon is both ancient and profound. Celebrated in art and music for centuries, the moon is a powerful symbol of our connection to the heavens and the mysteries of life beyond earth. The moon is hardly ever the main subject in visual art, but its inclusion creates a captivating center of interest in juxtaposition to the main subject. Photographing the moon itself, while appearing straightforward, presents several technical challenges. And incorporating it into a real-time composition can be a logistical challenge.

Technology has made the issue of proper exposure a lot easier to be sure. Being a brightly lit object, overexposure is a real problem. Being able to review exposure while shooting is a huge plus. The "Lunar 11" rule of thumb - holds that at an aperture of F11, the shutter speed will be the reciprocal of the ISO. In practice, this rule only applies to a full, or nearly full, moon with no intervening cloud cover, The proper exposure is affected not only by moon phase, but also by distance and changing atmospherics. Histogram review, liberal bracketing, and experience are the keys to success. While it may not appear so, the moon moves through the night sky fairly quickly. To prevent the shape of the moon from being distorted, and to reduce the effects of camera shake, higher shutter speeds are preferred, and tripod mounting is always desirable. Since the focus will always be at infinity, and DOF is not really an issue, it is reasonable to select an ISO that results in a good shutter speed, and bracket using aperture as the variable.

We generally want to place the moon into a landscape shortly after its rise, or just before it sets. Its relation to a foreground element of some sort almost always makes for a stronger image. For these and other reasons it is necessary to predict not only the time of the moon rise/set and the moon phase, but also where in the sky it will be at these critical times. There are now many smartphone/notepad "apps" available – either for free or very low cost – that make the job of predicting the behavior of the moon relatively easy for planning purposes. My short - 30 minute - program, scheduled for October 16, 2019 will discuss and illustrate these, and other aspects, of using the moon in photography. Also included will be a brief overview of the software (Photoshop) techniques used to balance foreground/background exposures to show the moon to best advantage; and also techniques to incorporate the moon into creative images that did not originally include it.





LEAF PEEPING 2019

Whether you head north or south, the fall colors should be spectacular this year. The summer rains have provided us with lush foliage. Of course, Mother Nature always has some tricks up her sleeve (i.e. hurricanes!), but let's hope for the best and head out to capture the glory of autumn!

Catskills

Mount Utsayantha is a two-mile back trail located near Stamford, NY, and is suggested for all skill levels (and your four-legged companions too!). You'll walk along a one-mile dirt road to a granite marker for Utsayantha, the burial ground for a local Indian maiden. At the top there are multipole viewpoints. Not far is the Blenheim Covered Bridge and Minekill Falls.
