Mark discusses his learning process and how the camera led him beyond his presuppositions to unforeseen compositions and vantage points, how it suggested when to re-visit a scene to see how subjects can be rendered at different times of day or in different light. He also explains how the camera helped him hone in subjects and refine compositions, and how by eliminating distractions, we

become more attune to color and shapes, patterns and textures.

By letting the camera guide us as we chase light, we become better artists, with a deeper understanding into the creative possibilities of Nature's ever-changing beauty.

Mark Bowie is a professional nature photographer, writer and much sought-after public speaker. His work has been published internationally in books and magazines, on calendars, posters, and greeting cards, and in advertising media. His first two coffee table books, *Adirondack Waters* and *In Stoddard's Footsteps*, have become landmark regional publications. He followed those with *The Adirondacks: In Celebration of the Seasons*. Each won the Adirondack Center for Writing's Photography Book of the Year Award. He has also authored two extensive e-books on night photography and one on his photographic journey, *Finding November*. He recently released a new instructional video—*Multiple Exposures for Maximum Landscapes*.

Mark is a staff instructor for the Adirondack Photography Institute and leads landscape photography workshops and tours.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

COMFORT ZONES

A week ago last Thursday I got a surprise call from one of my oldest friends; his son was getting married on Saturday. The son who Ellen and I saw moments after he was born on a frigid, snowy morning 25 years earlier.

We already had plans to be with our grandchildren in Connecticut that weekend. We were going to leave Connecticut for home on Saturday evening, so a 2 p.m. wedding just meant we had to leave a bit earlier. Joe told me his son had a friend from college who was a professional photographer. She would be the official wedding photographer, but because I'd been taking photos at his family gatherings for years, he asked if I would mind taking some candid photos. I told him I had never shot a wedding and it wasn't really something I felt comfortable doing.

He insisted. He was an old friend. I told him, "Yes."

I always carry my camera bag and five back-up batteries, and I figured the best lens in my arsenal for the task was a 16-55mm f/2.8 zoom. The only zoom I own, all my others being primes. The wedding was outdoors on a 350-acre farm in Old Chatham, so the 2.8 would do the trick. Magnificent fall day with a bit of a breeze; the fall colors were at peak. I knew that because we crossed over the Berkshires on our way to Connecticut and I had pestered my wife to let me stop and take some foliage shots. Never a good idea to get in the way of a grandmother's time with her grandchildren, so the stopping idea went nowhere.

Totally outside my comfort zone and with no plan in mind, I just walked around the grounds with a street shooter's eye and snapped away. Around 1,300 times. (And some people still shoot film...a



topic for another day.) I bought a nifty little piece of culling software a couple of months back, FastRawViewer, so if you're looking for a way to quickly scan your images, I can highly recommend it for \$19.95. It will save you a ton of time. Much faster than culling in Lightroom or Capture One, my new go-to post processing program.

I reduced my keepers to about ten percent and sent them off to my friend and his son. My friend was ecstatic, my friend's son, on the other hand, I haven't heard from. Because he's been married less than a week, I'm assuming he has other interests.

Outside my comfort zone but not uncomfortable. The pressure was off. After retiring from the corporate world, I have been studiously avoiding pressure. My wife would say I'm studiously avoiding work but that's a matter of semantics.

I thoroughly enjoyed my semi, no-pressure, spur-of-the-moment, casual wedding shoot and I've been thinking about other forms of photography I haven't been particularly interested in such as portrait, landscape, infrared, composite (although this is being written before the creativity seminar, so that might change) or fine art photography. I might never get to where they become a primary or secondary focus but I'm never going to know until I try them.

What type of photography have you been unwilling to get out of your comfort zone to try?

The goal of this evening's presentation is to get members inspired and enthusiastic about entering our annual Photo Essay Contest, which will take place this season on March 18, 2020.

That's plenty of time to get on your thinking caps on and create a digital, book or print photo essay on a subject near and dear to your heart. Everyone is a winner here...you create something meaningful for you to preserve your memories for many years to come.

And, who knows, you may even win a ribbon!

Dow Smith will speak about using your camera for video, and incorporating video into your digital presentation.

Linda Tommasulo will bring her poster samples and speak about creating a memorable photo book on line.

Photo Essay Competition Rules:

Print essays may be presented in book form: a collection of images assembled into a bound book such as those available from vendors like Shutterfly, Snapfish, Blurb and others. Alternatively, **Print essays** can be a collection of prints displayed in some other fashion, such as mounted on a board. Any method of presenting a collection of prints that can be physically managed by the entrant is allowable.

Digital essays are a collection of images that will be projected in some fashion, typically, but not necessarily, accompanied by a soundtrack. The presentation medium may be a digital slide show with or without music or sound, a video, or just a series of digital images. All projected essays must be in a format that is compatible with the projection equipment available on the night of the competition. Important Note: Digital essays must be submitted to Dow Smith by March 11 to assure compatibility with the Club's software.

The rules for entry are as follows:

- One entry per person per category (print and digital).
- Maximum length of a projected essay is 8 minutes. Suggested and preferred length is 3 to 5 minutes.
- Participants are encouraged to use only their own images. Other images may be used only if they are vital to the narrative quality of the essay. Any images not made by the participant must be credited. No more than 10% of the total images may be non-participant images.
- It is the participant's responsibility to know the rules. A submission outside of these guidelines will not be accepted.


Arbor Day Poster Contests Now Open

My love for photography started with my father, who took us around the world and always made slides and later photos of our family as I grew up. My own progression in photography seems to intersect with personal developments in my life.

Growing up as a teen in the early 1980's, I remember taking photos if my father let me borrow his camera. Though he never explained how the camera worked other than "point the camera at what you want to take a picture of and press this button," that seemed enough in the beginning. In my twenties I took photos with a basic Canon T50, an entry level 35mm film camera. I loved taking it all around the world with me and commemorating memories. When I met my husband in the late 1990's we took photos with several small digital point-and-shoot cameras, easy for travel and all the rage then. When I became pregnant, I decided I wanted to invest in a "good" camera and bought a 35mm Nikon N80. Color and Black-and-white film could still be bought in all the grocery stores and developing was not an exhausting search. In 2013 I became very active in my eldest child's elementary school PTO and interested in the Yearbook Committee. That summer I bought my very first digital single-lens reflex camera, a Canon T5i, which I still use to this day.

In 2012 I saw a Continuing Education class on digital photography and decided I would like to attend. I did so with my point-and-shoot small digital camera and my grown-up film Nikon. I heard "Raw," "Aperture" and many other terms for the very first time. But I couldn't really apply it to either camera fully. My kids were small and I was fully engaged in volunteering with multiple organizations and then working. So the lessons were forgotten and the automatic setting remained on my camera.

Since last year and after stopping to work full time, I have actively sought to become more involved in my passion of photography and how to leave the Automatic setting on my camera behind. I am realizing how much I have to still learn! At the Har-



vest moon recently, I wanted to take photos and took out my tripod, my Canon with my 200mm, then my 300mm and last my newly purchased 600mm lens. On my iPhone I googled what the best setting for moon photography was. With that it dawned on me that I know how to set either Aperture or Shutter priority on my camera, but not how to manipulate both settings at the same time in a complete manual setting. By the time I had my camera set up the clouds covered the moon completely and it started to rain. I immediately decided to sign up for a night photography workshop and to purchase the "Nikon T5i for Dummies" on Amazon. I also started to Google my lenses and what all the buttons on them were for. I know that I started out as many others, maybe a little later, but I am determined to learn as much as I can. My favorite objects to take photos of are my family and landscapes when traveling. Very recently I have discovered and become interested in trick and Night/Astro photography, a completely new concept for me.

Through the years I have volunteered to take free photos for different organizations, such as Niskayuna's Continuing Education program cover images, the Birchwood Elementary Yearbook Committee, the Plattsburgh March of Dimes, Operation At Ease, The American Infidels MCNY and the annual Ride for Missing and Exploited Children. My photos are also on the website and brochures of the German-American 2019 Steuben Parade. One of my photos won the German General Consulate in NYC "Germany" contest and is now hanging with the other winning photographs in the Visa department. My long-term goal is to sell some of my images online.



HOW TO PHOTOGRAPH STUNNING AUTUMN COLOR

Five Essential Fall Photography Tips

If you drive south you may still be able to capture some of the magic of autumn!

Autumn color season is one of the most eagerly anticipated times of the year for restless nature photographers. The brilliant red, orange, and yellow foliage is like a jarring wake up call for all the creative energy atrophied by the listless and drab dog days of late summer (August through mid-September has always been my least favorite time of year). And since these photos aren't going to just take themselves, here are five essential tips to help you make the most of the autumn color season.



Polarize

A polarizing filter removes glare from almost any non-metallic surface, which includes autumn leaves. Leaves have a waxy coating and they produce glare when viewed from certain angles. A polarizing filter makes fall color look more colorful and saturated but in reality, it's only allowing you to see the color that's already there. Wet leaves create even more glare so during rainy conditions, a polarizing filter is nearly essential.

When working near water, a polarizing filter will also remove glare and reflections from the water's surface and surrounding wet rocks. It will cut glare from water vapor and particulates in the air as well, making blue skies darker and richer in color. The direction of maximum polarization occurs at 90-degree angles from the sun, while no polarization occurs when shooting directly at or away from the sun. Therefore, no polarizer is necessary when photographing sunrises or sunsets.

Get a screw-in polarizing filter for your lens with the largest front element size, then step-up rings for those smaller lenses. Step-up rings are much more cost effective than a polarizer for each lens.

Some recommended polarizing filters:

B+W 77mm XS-Pro HTC Kaesemann Circular Polarizer with Multi-Resistant Nano Coating (\$\$\$)

Hoya 77mm HRT Circular PL Polarizer UV Multi-Coated Glass Filter (\$\$)

Lee Filters Circular Polarizer – Glass 100x100mm For Lee filter holder system.





Use Backlight

The leaves of autumn foliage are translucent, which means sunlight is allowed to partially pass through them when viewed or photographed from the opposite side. The foliage seems to glow and radiate the boldest colors when this happens. Seek out as many of these lighting opportunities as possible for stunning, luminous color.

This will work anytime there is direct sunlight. Even when most photographers retire during the “idle light” of midday, you can always aim the lens skyward as the canopy of yellows and reds glow against the complementary crisp blue sky. Stop the lens down to f/22 for a sun star to add additional interest.



Keys to Using Backlighting:

- Aim the camera toward the sun (duh!)
- Be aware of ghosting or flare when shooting into the sun. Your lens hood might help, although probably not if shooting directly into the sun, so consider using your hand, a hat, a book, anything that can block the sun's rays from striking the front element of the lens.
- Avoid underexposure. Your camera's meter will probably want to underexpose the scene under most backlighting conditions. Consider

adding a stop or two of exposure to keep the image from being too dark. Better yet, consult the histogram and “exposure to the right.”

- Look to add a sunstar for additional interest and a strong focal point of the image – if it needs one. A sunstar is created by using lens diffraction when a small aperture is used. A small aperture is associated with large f-stop numbers so a setting of f/22 usually does the trick. Best results are when you partially obscure the sun behind a tree branch or mountain, leaving only some of the sun's rays peeking through. Let diffraction do the rest.
- Try to employ complementary colors by shooting skyward on a sunny, blue-sky day. The warm tones in the backlit foliage fully complement the blues in the sky.



Use Telephoto Lenses to Isolate

You should look to use a short telephoto lens (70-200mm or even 100-400mm) to isolate patterns of autumn color, interconnected shapes, and textures within the larger landscape. A forest of trees, colorful or not, can be a confusing maze of visual chaos. But by isolating smaller vignettes with a telephoto lens, you can help bring some order to that chaos.

Telephoto isolation in landscape photography is the fine art of exclusion, stripping away any extraneous visual elements to reveal only the most essential and important parts of the scene. This is particularly true when shooting autumn color.

In the example on pg. 11, with a focal length of 85mm, I reveal to the viewer only a small section of a larger waterfall and scene, splitting the image into three equal sections: the autumn color, the falling water, and the distinctive glacial blue of the river.

Some short telephoto lenses to consider:

Canon EF 70-200mm f/2.8L IS II USM Telephoto Zoom Lens

Canon EF 70-200mm f/4 L IS USM Lens

Canon EF 100-400mm f/4.5-5.6L IS II USM Lens

Nikon AF-S NIKKOR 70-200mm f/2.8E FL ED VR

Sony FE 70-200mm f/2.8 GM OSS Lens



Look Down

When exploring autumn color scenes in the trees and hillsides, don't forget to look down at the ground at the "leaf litter" scattered along the forest floor, river rocks, trails, etc. This is particularly true in late autumn, my favorite part of the season when a lot of the leaves have already fallen, some of the trees are completely bare or still holding on to a few leaves, and there no longer is any green hanging around.

There are often many tiny scenes within the autumn leaves themselves found in the patterns of veins and variations in color found in a single fallen autumn leaf. A versatile macro lens of about 100mm is a useful tool for these types of images, like this image shown above.

Some suggested lenses:

Canon EF 100mm f/2.8L IS USM Macro Lens

Nikon AF-S VR Micro-NIKKOR 105mm f/2.8G IF-ED Vibration Reduction Fixed Lens

Sony SEL90M28G FE 90mm f/2.8-22 Macro G OSS Standard-Prime Lens



Look For Reflections

On any sunny autumn day, find a body of water that is in the shade but also near some brightly illuminated autumn color, such as a grove of colorful trees or hillside. Here is where you will find a great opportunity to photograph fall reflections. If the water is still enough, you can capture some literal reflections that create a mirror image of the primary subject. If the water is choppy from the wind or is moving, like you would find in a river or stream, you can make abstract reflections or colored water with longer exposures. The above image is an example of the latter, with a 10-second exposure being used to smooth out the water's surface.

These type of reflection images almost always need some help in the form of one or more visual anchors in addition to reflection. A rock or rocks, a log, or a duck are just some examples to look for when making autumn color photos of reflections. In order to get exposures of 10 seconds or longer during the middle of the day, you will need a strong neutral density filter of 6 to 10 stops in filter strength. I use the Lee Big Stopper (10 stops) and Little Stopper (6 stops) for these situations.
