

VIRTUAL DIGITAL COMPETITIONS 2021-2022 SEASON by Sean Sullivan

As the new season quickly approaches, our competitions will all be Digital once again. Since we are not meeting in person and going fully virtual again this season, there is no Print competition. In order to maintain our typical structure of having two monthly competitions we have once again added an Assigned Topics Digital image competition.

This season, the first Wednesday of each month (October thru April) will be our <u>Assigned Topics</u> Digital Image Competitions. The second Wednesday will be <u>General</u> and <u>Monochrome</u> Digital Image competition night.

The upload form is now open for the new season. You can upload images for any or all upcoming competitions for the season. As always, the form will close entries on midnight Saturday (Sunday morning) prior to the Wednesday competition night.

On the next screen you will see the four categories:

General / Monochrome Assigned Topic 1 / Assigned Topic 2

Then you will be asked to select the appropriate month.

Here are the closing dates for each month:

October, 2021: 10-2 and 10-09 November, 2021: 10-30 and 11-06 December, 2021: 11-27 and 12-4 January, 2022: 1-1 and 1-8 February, 2022: 1-29 and 2-5 March, 2022: 2-26 and 3-5 April, 2022: 4-2 and 4-9 As we did last season, you may enter up to four images (but no more than two per category). This means you can enter two images in General, two in Monochrome and two in each of the Assigned Topics. Assigned Topics can be found at https://spsphoto.org/programs/assigned-topics/.

All other digital image rules will still apply. The important ones to remember:

- No image that has previously placed or received HM may be re-entered in any future competitions.
- No image may be entered in more than ONE category in a single competition month.
- No image may be entered more than twice in a single season.
- Assigned topic images must have been taken AFTER May 1st, 2021.


We will be having a judge review and score the images offline prior to the competition nights' Zoom meetings. In order to ensure that the judge has adequate time to do this, **the cut off date/time for ALL competitions is midnight on the Saturday prior to the competition** (a/k/a Sunday morning). This cutoff is 100% FIRM and no exceptions will be made for late entries. On Sunday I will be compiling the entries and sending them to the Judge so that we can have the results back by Tuesday night. On the meeting night, the judge will join us remotely to give us their critique and announce the winners via Zoom.

At season end you will receive an email link to choose your images for submission to the Assigned and General/Monochrome Images of the Year Competitions.

I look forward to seeing what everyone has come up with the last year during COVID. If anyone has any questions, please feel free to email me at digitalchair@spsphoto.org.

If you're not computer literate, now is the time to start! If anything has come out of this pandemic, it is that we need to be computer savvy...Facetiming with family, Zooming with friends. Thankfully we have these options. Imagine what is was like in 1918!

The 2021-2022 season of SPS will be virtual. That is, meetings will be held on Zoom. Competitions will be digital only. Event nights will be on Zoom as well. If we're lucky, we will have a banquet in June. A real banquet, that is! Finger's crossed!

In the meantime, to participate members have to be "Zoom-savvy." It's really simple. You can download the software at **zoom.us**. Click on the banner at the top right: "Sign Up, It's Free." Once you have the Zoom app on your computer, laptop, iPad, SmartPhone, etc., you will be able to access the SPS meetings.

A day or two prior to the meeting, an email will be sent to all members with a link for log-in. Just click it and follow the instructions on the screen (prompt to open Zoom). Meetings are Wednesdays at 7 pm, as always.

You can chat with fellow members by clicking the little Chat symbol at the bottom of the screen. If the option is there, be sure to select "All presenters and attendees" so everyone can see and respond.



A HUMANITARIAN PHOTOJOURNALIST'S PERSPECTIVE By Connie Frisbee Houde

Over thirty years ago, I began to travel internationally—experiencing other parts of the world often very different in appearance from my own. It was exciting. I would fall in love with a place, its people and culture. I wanted to learn all I could from what I was seeing and experiencing. I would return a number of times to the same country to gain a deeper perspective, one that wasn't always evident in my first pass. I saw differences in the other, the unfamiliar.

For example in Peru in the barest of places far from a community as I would know it, people would share their limited food with our group hiking through their All photos © Connie Frisbee Houde

They shared of their lives as a way of their survival not as an expectation of a gift in return as it appeared on the surface.

In the Pashtunistan regions of Afghanistan they practice pashtunwali known as "the code of life." It is an exchange based on honor, revenge and hospitality not driven by economics. I experienced this when four of us arrived in a small northeastern community late in the day with no place to spend the night. The elders were gathered. After pleasantries and pedigrees were exchanged, we

land knowing that they would receive something return-a in helping hand for the community, extra food that we might have, clothing we didn't need. This was Ayni the Quechua belief in sacred reciprocity that everything in the world is connected. It is an exchange energy of between humans, nature, and the universe.


explained why we had come to their community. We were exploring the need and receptivity for an eye care team to service the area. The elders decided our fate, determining that we were welcome to stay. A family agreed to gave us dinner, women in one room and men in another. The guests were fed first and the family ate what remained and we slept with them using their blankets as well as what we had brought.



Can you imagine this in an American community? It may happen as a result of extraordinary circumstances-a flood, a fire-not as an everyday occurrence. I experienced the similarities of these cultures, the Peruvian ayni and Afghanistan pashtunwali, only because I traveled off the beaten tourists track to see what I could, not expecting to experience ways of life so different from my own. As a result, my life has been changed and is much richer as a result of choosing to adopt these concepts as a part of my own life.

How did I get to have these experiences? I believe it began with my first experience as a travel photographer which set the tone of future journeys. It

was on the south coast of Peru, participating in a salvage archeological project, working to identify textiles, my area of knowledge. As I tried to figure out how some of the pieces were made by reading and following directions in the research texts available to the team with no good results. I learned that in the highlands women still used the techniques I was seeing. My reaction was. "Where? Please show me! I want

to learn how." With several return trips hiking in the highlands visiting weavers, I realized there was another layer. These women were telling stories with their designs. They were depicting their surroundings and their beliefs. Who could teach me of the cosmology of these peoples? All the time with camera in hand, I was documenting the processes and the people who were creating these textiles where they lived. I constantly questioned how I could portray their beauty and diversity without invading their privacy, without sensationalizing or emphasizing the poverty or difficulties of their daily lives. How could I be respectful and still tell their stories?

Very early in my career as a travel photographer I saw my responsibility was to record what I was seeing, to share my images with those who would never travel beyond their own communities or the major cities of a foreign county which often cater to a foreigner's wishes rather than revealing the depth of their own culture. I would come home from a trip feeling that the images I had just taken could never portray the power and resilience of the people I had met. Across time, as I became a better photographer, the response to my images helped me realize that I was conveying some of these feelings to the viewer.

Reactions sometimes have to do with who is looking at a particular image. What are their own beliefs? What do they bring to viewing their surroundings? One of my images in particular comes to mind as an example. It is of three turban-clad Afghan men who where very curious about the process of having their eyes examined, something they had never done before. Many people interpreted this as three men looking out of the image with apprehension. Others immediately turned the photograph into a political statement. They saw Osama Ben Laden figures, or in other words the "enemy." This made me strive harder to capture the underlying universality of humanity. It also brought to mind a quote from Nelson Mandela, "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." Taking his advice to heart, I use my images to teach about my experiences through articles and exhibitions. Then maybe the images and I can make a difference. I choose where and how I travel to be involved with humanitarian projects that put into practice what I have learned. A side benefit is I have the opportunity to deepen my sense of people and place.

In this last year (2020/2021) when travel has been impossible because of the pandemic, it has been an opportunity to review and reflect about my experiences and what I see in my photographs. What do I WANT to convey? What AM I conveying? As we question the world around us within a smaller geographic area because of the pandemic, if we are lucky we can strive to make a better place for all people. What connects us as people from all walks of life, all countries? Looking at the word

"perspective," one definition is "the capacity to view things in their true relations or relative importance." 1 see myself working to raise consciousness, to open a person's perspective and perhaps change their view of the world, or at least the small have part Т shared through my images and words. My goal is to guide people to see hu-



manity not as filled with white, black, brown, red, yellow or any color people. I strive to have my images convey, to the viewer, human beings who may be different than they themselves are, and yet are not an enemy because of perceived differences. I hope that the viewer sees an image that inspires them to open to the unexpected and that it may affect their own experience of the world.

As I look at my images, I realize that the bottom line is love. Love for the work, the place, the people, the experience–you name it. It is not a sappy Hollywood approach. It is a curiosity for life, for what I have seen and experienced. Fear is also a part of the process. The fear of can I do it? Can I capture the essence of the place and people I meet? Do I really have any kind of understanding of the people and place? Can I be honest and at the same time respectful? Can I do justice to them so that those who don't travel can experience the beauty and resilience of these people I am meeting with my camera? What can I give back to them for allowing me to be a part of their lives, no matter how briefly?




SPS BACK TO SCHOOL
